

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Architectural gems, in and outside the city



Inside/out. outside/in

The Royal Danish Library and SMK (the National Gallery of Denmark) both comprise clever transitions from old to new or the other way round. Beautiful and eye-catching from the outside and truly fascinating and full of contrast from the inside. It's a bit like stepping into a time machine.

SMK has been built in many stages over the years, but the biggest addition was designed by the architect Anna Maria Indrio of C.F. Møllers Tegnestue, and was completed in 1998. The white, modernist wing is built in direct continuation of the older building, and is constructed in such a way that the elongated, high-ceilinged space between the old and the new wing forms an internal sculpture garden. SMK has a comprehensive permanent collection and temporary exhibitions this year include "Carl Bloch – Seduced", "BAROQUE" and Jessie Kleemann's first solo exhibition in a Danish museum

Situated on Slotsholmen, The Royal Danish Library stretches across three very different buildings. Facing the water (and going backwards in time) there's The Black Diamond, designed by the Danish architectural firm Schmidt Hammer Lassen, completed in 1999, in the centre – a narrow extension by Preben Hansen from 1968, and at the back – H.J. Holm's historical library building from 1906. Here you will also find the tranquil library garden. Be sure to look up when crossing the bridge that connects the Black Diamond to the older buildings – there you will see Per Kirkeby's large ceiling fresco.

Danish Architecture Centre

DAC is the primary partner for the World Capital of Architecture programme and naturally will act as the epicentre for a wide range of activities and exhibitions during the year. A highlight is DAC's first permanent exhibition about Danish architecture aptly named "Made in Denmark". The exhibition unfolds the history of Danish architecture from the Viking era to the present day, providing an opportunity for guests to become immersed in the architecture, and experience how vital it is for democratic society. Guided tours of Copenhagen Architectural gems are also offered by DAC guides on weekends, all year round. The ticket includes access to DAC for 24 hours after the tour so you can visit DAC, go on the guided tour of the city and then visit DAC again! The exhibition "Copenhagen in Common" explores architecture as the framework of our lives - communal urban areas, residential areas and the institutions we use throughout life. What the city means to us and how can we use it to its fullest.

Hidden underground


The Cisterns (a former water reservoir, built in the mid 1800s) located underneath the spacious park Søndermarken in Frederiksberg, is a truly breathtaking and intense space – a contemporary art gallery with reverberating surroundings, high humidity and stalactites. Not to mention that it is pretty dark down there, so your eyes need time to adjust and with reverb of 17 seconds, it's important to talk quietly so you don't disturb the other quests' experience of the space. And, it can be pretty chilly (even in the summer) - so remember to bring warm clothing. From March to September 2023, guests can experience the South Korean artist Kimsooja's total installation "Weaving the Light", creating an illusory space, with light splitting into all the colours of the rainbow, totally embracing the architectural space and transforming it into a floating sea of light.



Getting out of town

ARKEN opened in 1996 and is housed in a striking and monumental building by Søren Robert Lund, based on the concept of two diagonals that cross each other and with references to ship design and Russian constructivism. Opening an art museum in Ishøj was the part of a greater (and lengthy) plan to turn the Western part of Copenhagen into a significant cultural area. And, this plan has definitely worked, not only because of the beautiful piece of architecture that forms its physical base, or the permanent collection or a constant stream of world-class temporary exhibitions, but also because of the location, the nearby sea and the sparse landscape around it. It only takes 20 minutes

to walk from Ishøj Station (16–25 minutes by train from Copenhagen Central Station) to the museum, via the path system and it is a great way to experience the surrounding landscape and how the building is placed within it. The 2023 calendar includes an exhibition of some of the pieces in ARKEN's permanent collection, curated by the Danish artist Esben Weile Kjær, Refik Anadol's Nature Dreams and Haus-Rucker-Co's Giant Billiard.

Louisiana Museum of Modern Art is located in Humlebæk, 45 minutes (by train and on foot) from Copenhagen Central Station. This must-see art museum is nestled between the Sound (Øresund) and the forest, and when it's warm enough you can sit outside on the lawn and eat your lunch, while looking out to sea. And, you could also add a walk in the forest to your day's outing. Louisiana is a really important piece of Danish modernist architecture, and fits gracefully and harmoniously into the surrounding landscape. The museum has grown considerably since opening in 1958 – with seven extensions in total and all carried out by the architects Bo and Wohlert, and by the architect Claus Wohlert, with the East Wing and beyond. The Sculpture Park is beautifully put together and lends a sense of adventure as you discover the various works, some are easy to spot, while others are so well integrated that you may walk straight past them. There is something very soothing about Louisiana, and every visit leaves one enriched and fulfilled.

A living landmark of Copenhagen



Built by King Christian IV in 1642, the Round Tower is a unique attraction in the heart of Copenhagen, loved for its spectacular architecture and historical significance. Its characteristic Spiral Ramp and scenic view from the top are definite must-sees.

Stargazing Above Copenhagen

The Round Tower was initially built as an observatory for astronomers to study the skies. Today, it is home to exhibitions, concerts and cultural as well as astronomical events. Walk up the Spiral Ramp to visit Europe's oldest working observatory and look through the telescope yourself on special days.

Arts, Culture and Science in the Library Hall

Don't miss the Library Hall on your way down. Here, the old University Library has been transformed into a bright exhibition space featuring a diverse programme. In 2023, visitors can experience exhibitions ranging from a private collection of kimonos to an exhibition about Denmark's relationship with wolves.

Tales of the Tower

A wealth of stories have accumulated in the Round Tower through history. With the app Useeum you can immerse yourself in the tales of the tower anywhere. Listen to the stories of how Hans Christian Andersen gathered inspiration from books in the Library Hall or how a car once rode up the Spiral Ramp.

Copenhageners recommend

I would say you should go to Glyptoteket. It's perfect. It's such a beautiful old institution with so much history. And then I would also recommend Christiansborg, the parliament, but especially the little garden behind it. Once you're there, you should also visit the Royal Library. It's fun to see the contrast between the new and the old building. I would also recommend the whole area around Vesterbro. There is so much shopping and the area has a bit of an edge. Not just fancy shops. If you need to relax, go to Havnebadet at Islands Brygge.

The good thing about Copenhagen is that it is not bigger than you can experience all the different neighbourhoods in one long stroll. The best way to experience Copenhagen is to just wander through the different neighbourhoods. If you're going out at night, go to Mojo Blues bar. There's music every night. If you don't have to get up early the next morning, go to Café Intime in Frederiksberg. It's a time capsule and all kinds of people go there. There's almost a bit of a Bohemian 20's vibe about the place. If you're going to explore outdoors, seeing Copenhagen from the water is a must. You don't have to rent a private boat; you can just take the harbour bus.

The most important place to visit in Copenhagen is Christiania. It's one of a kind, so it's very important. It's a parallel community in Copenhagen, which is very special. You can get a very good pizza slice at Sunshine Bakery there. You can also get a good piece of cake there. That's excellent too. Otherwise, go out on the embankment at Christiania. It's so close to the city and could be compared to wild nature, whereas some of the parks in Copenhagen for instance are much better maintained.

If you visit Copenhagen, you should go to Holmen. All the ship stuff out there is so spectacular and there are really good walking routes too. You don't have to sit at the food markets all the time. Walk along the harbour and see what's out there, it's beautiful. And very varied. I would suggest that you walk out to where the military area starts. Then turn to the right, and you will see some new houses. It's a very special area. The Danish ship DANMARK is often down there as well, so you can see them going up and down the mast and things like that.

ARKEN showcases one of Scandinavia's finest collections of contemporary art and is one of Denmark's newest contemporary art museums. Remember to bring your bathing suit when you visit ARKEN, as the museum has one of Denmark's most beautiful sandy beaches just outside its door. You can also take a walk among the many sculptures in the sculpture park, where you can encounter works by artists including Olafur Eliasson, Antony Gormley and Karolin Schwab. It only takes 16 minutes by train from Copenhagen to Ishøj Station – and from here you can either bike to the museum or walk along the art path ARKENWALK – lit up by the artist Jeppe Hein's playful and humorous "Modified Street Lights".

BUTTERFLY! ARKEN's collection curated by Esben Weile Kjær, whom is a rising star on the international art scene, presenting performances at Art Basel Miami and Centre Pompidou Paris. He is the first 'outsider' ever to stage an exhibition of Contemporary art at Arken.

Burning off steam and stepping into the past

Copenhagen and the surrounding areas offer a wide range of museums perfectly suited to children and families, with hands-on, active and innovative experiences that make a lasting impression on the entire family.

A sailing nation

The Viking Ship Museum (in Roskilde) testifies to a time of great adventure and prosperity, portraying the Viking Age in a way that you almost feel like you have been transported back in time. The permanent exhibitions focus on the five Skuldelev ships and tell stories of the many Scandinavian maritime achievements, where we are reminded how the Vikings changed the world with their ships. The adjacent boatyard specialises in full-scale reconstructions of Viking vessels, as well as new boats using the building methods of the time.

The historic warships on Holmen tell a story of the Cold War and the Danish Navy's work in the latter part of the 20th Century. There's the frigate "Peder

Skram", the torpedo boat "Sehested" and the submarine "Sælen", all providing the perfect waterside adventure. And perhaps the best part is that you are actually allowed to touch everything, and experience first hand what it was like to work in the operations room and the radio room, or operate the on-board weapons. There is an authenticity here – thanks to the smell, the confined spaces and a series of stories recounting life at sea and war, and maybe also the feeling that these well maintained vessels look like they could still be in use.

City life, then and now

Rundetaarn (built by King Christian IV in the 1630/40s) stands gallantly in middle of town and there is something really special about such an iconic and beautiful landmark being a place that one just passes by on the way to buy shoes or the library. Its location is not its only asset though, as soon as you start climbing the spiral ramp you realise that. The ramp is so much fun to run up and down, and there are small recesses in the walls along the way, providing the best hiding places. And, when you get to the top you are rewarded with the most stunning view of the city.

At the Workers Museum you can experience what it was like to be a worker or a part of a worker's family in Denmark in the 19th and 20th century. The museum is situated in the historic workers' union and meeting place in central Copenhagen. The relief's on the walls of the assembly hall from 1879 display stories of

everyday conditions, solidarity, hard work and dedication and the red union flags stand proud, testifying to an active and successful union movement. The museum is filled with reconstructions of various rooms and everyday situations, which are not only homey and welcoming but also historically interesting. And, be prepared for a bit of a surprise when venturing out into the backyard to inspect the outdoor lavatories that used to be commonplace in Copenhagen at the turn of the last century.

In the children's section, visitors can among other things dress-up, hear stories about working class life, try working in a grocery shop or play with toys from the 1930s.

Living and not so living history

The Museum of Natural History includes the museum building and the surrounding Botanical Gardens, and houses an array of artefacts as well as living plants – comprising approximately 14 million objects collected over 400 years, including skins, skeletons, insects which have been pointed, herbariums, fossils, minerals and meteorites. The living collection includes approximately 12,000 different plant species, such as orchids, cacti, carnivorous plants and exotic tree species. The Butterfly House is open during the summer months and provides visitors with the opportunity to observe the butterflies' transformation and life in an exotic habit of orchards and pineapple plants.

The National Museum of Denmark is the largest museum of cultural history and incorporates 20 museums around the country. The Ny Vestegade location houses a rich collection of objects and temporary exhibitions.

The museum offers the most wonderful children's section where there is no such thing as "Do not touch". Go on a voyage in a Viking ship or experience what it was like to be a school child in the 1930s or make a meal in a medieval kitchen. Be on the lookout for The Boredom Button when exploring the rest of the museum. Anything can happen when you push the button, allowing the museum to truly come to life.

M/S Maritime Museum of Denmark

Set sail towards the Maritime Museum of Denmark – the building and architecture in itself is worth a visit.

From a distance, only a keen eye can spot something lurking on the horizon. Located below sea level, in the middle of the newly renovated Culture Harbour Kronborg in Elsinore and neighbouring the majestic Kronborg Castle, you will find Denmarks Maritime Museum designed by the renowned Danish architect Bjarke Ingels (BIG). Within the walls of the dry dock, you can experience over 600 years of Danish maritime history, all presented in an interactive space that allows you to explore first hand what it has been like to be a sailor throughout time.

With the Dream Ship, a 400m2 maritime play world, the museum has one of the best experiences for children. Here you can dress up as a captain or stoker, sing sailor karaoke and if you're brave enough get tattooed like a real pirate. Take a break in the museum's M/S Café where you can get delicious lunch dishes, hot and cold drinks, and light refreshments, all set in the ambiance of where the Danish ships have been kept alive for a century.

Danish Museum of Science & Technology

Have you ever dreamt of sitting behind the wheel of one of the very first cars? Or be a pilot in an aircraft? The Danish Museum of Science and Technology is for everyone interested in the history of technology.

Wander through an impressive collection of steam engines, electrical inventions, bicycles, cars and airplanes that will take you on a journey through time. At the museum, you can see the world's oldest working car from 1888, the Danish aviation pioneer Ellehammer's aircraft from 1906, or original LEGO from 1958. There is something for everyone, from nerdy insights into the mechanics of different machinery to the more mystical side of modern technology. The museum boasts of both old and new inventions and makes you wonder, which future objects might be added to the collection, in a world of technology that is constantly evolving.

Munkeruphus

Located on the Øresund coast between Dronningmølle and Gilleleje, north of Copenhagen, Munkeruphus offers a scenic and peaceful getaway from the hustle of the city. Munkeruphus is an architectural gem. Built in colonial style with wooden cladding and a tall shingle roof, the building provides a rare example of American Art and Crafts influence on Danish architecture. Constructed in 1916 for civil engineer Frederik Raaschou and his family, it now serves as a contemporary exhibition space, a café, and a small gift and bookshop run by the Munkeruphus Trust. Intertwining art, nature, and learning, Munkeruphus functions as part art gallery and part outdoor learning space where professional artists and nature guides are involved in creative teaching. Enjoy a nice cup of coffee, while savouring the view of Munkeruphus' winding paths, great old trees, open lawns and beautiful views of the sea. If you bring your swimwear, you can go for a quick dip or stroll along the beach before heading back to the city.

Rudolph Tegners Museum and statue park

It almost feels like moving into another world when you wander through the moorland of the natural resort of Russia. Shooting up from the heather, you'll find a series of classically styled monumental bronze sculptures. These are the work of one of Denmark's greatest sculptors, Rudolph Tegner (1873–1950), whose museum-mausoleum displays over 250 of his intense, dramatic and vast artworks. Designed by the artist himself, Rudolph Tegner decided to build the museum as if one was stepping into a treasure chamber. The large building consists of an octagonal room with an impressive 11 metre tall ceiling, with no openings in the facade, except for a large glass ceiling.

After having walked through the park, and experienced the octagonal museum room, you can visit the café where you can get lunch or a cup of coffee. Though the museum is only open during the summer, the park is open all year round and worth a visit. Here you can find 14 Rudolph Tegner statues, while walking around the heathery hills, free of charge.

In 2023, Copenhagen has been named the UNESCO World Capital of Architecture. As the primary partner for the World Capital of Architecture program, Danish Architecture Center (DAC) will be the epicenter for a wide range of activities and exhibitions that you won't want to miss. Experience a strong 2023 program with exhibitions, guided tours, family workshops, debates, podcasts, events and much more.

What's Happening in 2023

In 2023, Danish Architecture Center is opening a long-awaited permanent exhibition on Danish architecture – the first ever. The exhibition tells the history of Danish architecture from the Viking Age to today. In May, a special exhibition will be opening under the City of Copenhagen's theme for the year of architecture: Copenhagen in Common. And in March, the

international phenomenon Open House will take place for the first time in Copenhagen, where guests are invited inside buildings in the city that are otherwise closed to the public. In November, we will be opening another special exhibition that will allow guests at DAC to experience in new ways how architecture is something that affects all of the senses.

City Walks

Every weekend, you can join DAC's guided tours (in Danish and English) and explore the architecture in and around Copenhagen. We unfold Copenhagen's unique architectural history from when it became an actual city up to today's booming urban paradise. All tour tickets include free entrance to DAC and the current exhibitions.

Day one

Kl. 08.30 – Breakfast at Café Sonny



Start your day with one of the best breakfast's in Copenhagen, at café Sonny on Rådhusstræde 5. Grab a freshly baked roll with a soft-boiled egg or try their yoghurt & homemade granola. If you're a morning person you can stop by as early as 7.30 to get your coffee fix.

Kl. 09.30 – Copenhagen Museum

Next up, head towards Copenhagen Museum, only a 5-minute bike ride away. The Copenhagen Museum is a fantastic place to visit for anyone interested in the history and culture of Copenhagen and Denmark.

One of the things that makes the Copenhagen Museum special is its extensive collection of artefacts, and artefacts related to the history

of Copenhagen. The museum has a large collection of art, including paintings, sculptures, and prints, as well as a range of historical objects, such as coins, pottery, and clothing dating all the way back to 12.000 BC.

• 12.30 – Lunch at Schønneman

It's time for lunch, so hop on your bike and make your way to one of the oldest restaurants in Copenhagen. Restaurant Schønnemann dates back to 1877 and is renowned for its 'smørrebrød' – Open-faced sandwiches that come with an abundance of fillings. A classic is fried fillet of plaice that comes in five different versions.

URS

Kl. 14.30 - Medical Museion

If you're interested in how the human body has been perceived through history, the Medical Museion is right up your alley. The museum features a number of exhibits that explore different aspects of medicine, including the history of

diseases, the evolution of medical treatment, and the development of medical technology. Visit the anatomical theatre from 1787, where students used to perform autopsies and learn about the human anatomy.

• 16.00 – The Amalienborg Museum

The last sightseeing destination of the day takes you past the winter residence of H.M Oueen of Denmark and the home of the Crown Prince couple and their children. The Amalienborg complex consists of four identical palaces and where built between 1750-1760. The Palaces were originally built for important noblemen, but Amalienborg became the royal residence after Christiansborg Castle burned on the night between 26 and 27 February 1794. One of the palaces, Christian VIII palace, has been turned into the Amalienborg Museum where you can experience the Royal Representation Rooms, the Fabergé Chamber and the Gala Hall. Take a stroll through the adjoining Amalie Garden, one of the newest parks of Copenhagen designed by the Belgian architect Jean Delogne.

Kl. 19.00 - Dinner at Barraba

Back on the bike, now head to restaurant Barraba at Store Kongensgade 34 where you'll find tasty Italian dishes – there is something for both the traditionalists and the adventurous. The wine list is extensive and the kitchen is open until late, so there is plenty of time for a quick nap or a pick-me-up before dinner

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Day two

KI. 09.00 - Breakfast at Hart

Start your day with a quick breakfast on the other side of Copenhagen Harbour. At Hart on Holmen you'll find some of the best bread and pastries Copenhagen has to offer – and that says a lot. Take a stroll in the area and enjoy the atmosphere by the water – 5 minutes from there you'll find the Copenhagen Opera House which is said to be a lot more beautiful on the inside than outside. We'll let you decide.

Kl. 11.00 - North Atlantic House

Next up is a visit to the North Atlantic House, a cultural centre focusing on art, music, films and performances from Greenland, Iceland, The Faroese Islands and the rest of the North. The North Atlantic House is located in an old warehouse on the harbour front and we highly recommend a tour of the neighbourhood.

13.00 - Lunch at Kanalhuset

Not far from the North Atlantic House on the historic island Christianshavn along the Christianshavn Canal you'll find Kanalhuset – A hotel and eatery, placed in a beautiful building from 1754. Lunch is served everyday between 13-15 (Sat/Sun. 12-15) and it's also possible to have dinner here. Dinner is served at 19.00 all through the week, for only 150 DKK. And the menu changes every day.

Kl. 15.00 – The Tower of Our Savior's Church

Now it's time to get a bit of perspective on the city. It's a bit of workout – but we promise, the view will be worth your while. If you climb the 400 steps to the top of the tower of Our Saviour's Church you'll have a spectacular view of Copenhagen. On the last 150 external steps, you can see the city from every angle at a height of 86 metres.

18.00 – Dinner at Reffen

We hope you've worked up an appetite because next up is dinner at Reffen – A big outside food market at Refshaleøen. With more than 30 different food stalls, there is something for almost everyone – whether you're into tacos, hotdogs, sushi, Nepalese food or fish & chips. At

Reffen, there are also different bars and the renowned Danish brewery Mikkeller has a spot there too. During the summer, you can hang out by the water in a beach chair and there are often different events going on.

Danish artists through time

Copenhagen and its surrounding areas offer excellent museums and exhibitions that allow visitors to walk in the footsteps of some of Denmark's greatest artists and thinkers. Take a trip to the Heerup Museum, David's Collection or Thorvaldsen's Museum and get a feel for the artists who paved the way for Danish art.

Thorvaldsens Museum (1770-1844)

The Danish sculptor and artist Bertel Thorvaldsen (1770-1844) is considered one of the most important Danish artists of the 19th century. He is known for his Neoclassical sculptings often depicting mythological and biblical figures. Although Thorvaldsen is a famous Danish artist, he spent most of his career in Rome. Here he created many works that can be seen in churches and museums throughout Europe. Visitors to the Thorvaldsens Museum, located in the centre of Copenhagen, can see a collection of his sculptures including his famous statue of Christ.

The museum itself is a unique building and was built to house Thorvaldsen's sculptures and is an excellent example of the architectural style, Neoclassicism. The building's façade is adorned with a beautiful frieze depicting scenes from the celebration of his return to Copenhagen in 1838, after 40 years abroad. Visiting the Thorvaldsens Museum is an excellent way for visitors to experience Thorvaldsen's art and understand his place in Danish art and cultural history.

The Hirschsprung Collection (Købke 1810-1848)

If you are interested in Danish art from the 19th and early 20th centuries, you should visit the Hirschsprung Collection. Located in the beautiful park Østre Anlæg, the museum houses major works by the father of the Danish Golden Age, Christen Købke. At the age of 12, Christen showed great talent and started at the Royal Danish Academy of Art in 1822, where he learned the art of depicting the beautiful Danish landscapes. Through the museum's exhibitions, you can let yourself be lost in the stunning interpretations of landscapes that defined Danish art in the 19th century.

Bakkehuset (H. C. Andersen (1805-1875)

Bakkehuset is an authentic Golden Age home filled with history, and together with the surrounding garden, the museum provides an atmospheric insight into 19th century lifestyle. Owned by Knud and Kamma Rahbek, the house became a centre for influential Danish thinkers of the 19th century. During the Rahbek family's time, leading figures such as H.C. Andersen, Adam Oehlenschläger, H.C. Ørsted, N.F.S. Grundtvig, Johan Ludvig Heiberg and many more stayed in the home. They all contributed in their own way to Bakkehuset's history and unique atmosphere.

The world-famous Hans Christian Andersen (1805-1875) came to Bakkehuset as a guest in his youth and warmly described Kamma Rahbek in his memoirs. Like other poets and writers of the time, the young man read his plays aloud to the hostess of Bakkehuset to hear her opinion. According to Hans Christian Andersen, Kamma Rahbek was the first person to call him by the title "poet", and this finally convinced him that poetry was to be his goal in life.

The interior of the museum is recreated as it was when Knud and Kamma Rahbek lived there in the early 1800s. Furthermore, in front of the museum you will find the orangery, with a menu inspired by meals served at the house at the time of Kamma and Knud Lyne Rahbek.

The David Collection (Hammershøi – 1864-1916)

Wilhelm Hammershøi was a Danish painter known for his sparse, moody interiors and landscapes. His works often featured empty rooms or empty streets, and he was known for his use of light and shadow to create a sense of atmosphere. Even though the paintings themselves may not depict much action, it is often said that viewers will feel a strong emotional response when seeing them in real life. Visitors to the David Collection can see a collection of Hammershøi's works and learn more about his influence on Danish art, culture and history. Furthermore, the museum has an extensive collection of Islamic art, which provides visitors with an opportunity to explore the art and culture of the Islamic world.

Heerup Museum

The artist Henry Heerup (1907–1993) was a Danish painter, sculptor and graphic artist known for his abstract and surrealistic works. Henry Heerup has a unique place in Danish art history, and with his distinctive style, he left his mark on the art scene of the time, with his innovative garbage art and unique contribution to printmaking. Visitors to the Heerup Museum can see a wide range of Heerup's works, including paintings, sculptures, and graphic prints, and get a feel for his abstract way of thinking.

Birgit, 64, retired

I come from the area Amager, so I would say Amager Strandpark. You can walk 8-5 km along the water out to Kastrup. I like that a lot. And it's easy to get there by metro. If you want to eat here as a tourist, I think you should try the place called Kanalhuset in Christianshavn. You sit at a long table and eat together, always talking to the people sitting next to you. That's the concept. If you come and you want to talk to someone local, then I think you should go and eat there. And it's budgetfriendly.

If I were a tourist, I would go to the Jewish Cemetery. I think it's very special. I also think you should walk over the Queen Louise's Bridge and to the left and have a coffee at the French Café. I think that's a cool local thing to do. It's not so touristy. If you're going out at night, I'd go to Bobi Bar. There's a really cool atmosphere in there.

Susanne, 51, teacher

I've just been to the Royal Theatre to see a dance performance. I think you should do that. Otherwise, I'd go to the cinema called Grand. It's a special cinema with a bit of nostalgia, but also cool films. Quirky films too. Some of those films that make you think about them after you've seen them. There are also some nice little museums in the city. The art museum GL STRAND, for instance, is maybe a bit of a secret for tourists.

I would definitely recommend stopping by Grød, which is a really delicious place to eat. They have really good alternatives, even if you don't eat meat, and if you need something good for lunch. The Tivoli Gardens is almost a must see. If you're into fun and fairytales, and have a bit of a childlike spirit, then you should go there. The Christmas decorations are also really beautiful if you visit at that time of the year.

Karla, 22, on the way to Bali & Trine, 50, librarian

We would recommend Assistens Cemetery. It's a perfect place to walk around and get lost. The funny thing about it is that it is used more as a park than a cemetery. It's a little bit of a breathing space in the middle of the city. Within the art world, then definitely the National Museum of Art. Or the David Collection! It's always free. We're actually out today painting some of the sculptures. You can do that at the Zoo, too. If you have kids with you, go to 'De Gamles By' in Nørrebro. You can pet goats there, and it's a super nice place to be. Blågardsgade, Fælledvej and Elmegade are really nice streets. If you need to get something to eat in that area, there's also some really delicious sushi in Elmegade.




Poul, 39, engineer

I don't really think you need to go into central Copenhagen. It's not super interesting. So maybe a recommendation to stay away from the central parts of Copenhagen. Just a few hundred meters away from Copenhagen's Central station you can escape the city's hustle and bustle and enter a hidden oasis. Let yourself enjoy the Glyptotek's relaxing atmosphere amid high palm trees, tons of marble and several thousand years of art. The museum offers one of the world's finest collections of antique sculpture, Egyptian tomb treasures and mummies, Danish Golden Age painters and French masterpieces.

You can explore the unparalleled art and architecture and enjoy a break at the café in the lush winter garden afterwards

Special Exhibitions in 2023

The museum's changing special exhibitions add to the outstanding permanent collections. They offer relevance and new perspectives on the museum's own artworks as well as works on loan from other important cultural institutions.

From January to June, you can join us on a trip to Egypt in the special exhibition 'Amarna – City of the Sun God':

The year is 1365 BCE. We are in ancient Egypt, where magic and animal deities play a crucial role in society. When Pharaoh Akhenaten comes to power, he abol-

ishes the ancient animal deities and ordains a new religion. Now, it is permitted only to worship only one god - the sun god, Aten. The new cult leads to major social upheaval, and the royal couple decides to move and build a new place of residence: a magnificent new city, known today as Amarna. Experience an exhibition about Amarna's rise and fall and meet the pharaoh, his wife Nefertiti and his son, the child king Tutankhamun, who was born in Amarna. From May to November, visitors can explore the architecture of the Glyptotek in a special exhibition.

What stories lurk in the richly decorated, grand building and behind the facades? In 2023, Copenhagen is the World Capital of Architecture. To mark the occasion, the Glyptotek is presenting an exhibition telling the story of the museum's buildings, featuring architectural models, photos, drawings, film and sound, and installations showing sections of the buildings' structures.

June 2023 will see the opening of the Glyptotek's biggest ever contemporary art venture. Copenhagen Contemporary (CC) and the Glyptotek are collaborating to present the first-ever exhibition in Scandinavia devoted to the work of the artist Abbas Akhavan (b. 1977 in Tehran. Lives and works in Montreal). Based on the Glyptotek's collections of antiquities from the Middle East, Akhavan will create an exhibition that will be presented in both institutions – gracing both the raw industrial halls of CC and the historic architecture of the Glyptotek.

When the weather gods permit, you can enjoy the view over Copenhagen's roofs – and a cold drink – from the rooftop terrace.

Rosenborg Castle, King's Garden





The museum comprises three permanent collections whose nucleus dates back to the days of its founder, C. L. David: the Collection of Islamic Art, the Collection of European Art, and the Collection of Danish Early Modern Art.The Collection of Islamic Art - internationally, the museum's most important one – encompasses exquisite decorative art from the 7th century to the mid-19th century from an area that extends from Spain in the west to China in the east, from Uzbekistan in the north to Yemen in the south.
