
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

ENIGMA

ENIGMA Museum of Communication is located in Fælledparken, in the eastern part of Copenhagen. It houses the national collection within post and telecommunications. Discover the history of communication and explore the innovations and technological development that has led to today's many ways to communicate with each other. With the reopening of the museum in 2023, the museum has created a large children's area, where the little ones can discover the world of communication with historic eyes.

The David Collection

Once you step into The David Collection, a world of technology will unwrap, in the shape of curious inventions and impressive craftmanship. Go visit the former private home and its versatile art collection, and try and find the technological works of art. In the Islamic collection you can explore medieval, Islamic science and technology from a shrine from Iran with a combination lock that has over 4 billion combinations, to a medieval book describing the invention of a robot.

Medical Museion

Medical Museion is a university museum dedicated to examining, collecting and disseminating medical science and health, through material culture and history. But it's not only interesting to visit Medical Museion if you are a medical student! Medical Museion is a fascinating place to dive into medical history, the development of medical technology and how it has affected our understanding of medicine, diseases and all-round view of humanity, from then till now.

The Viking Ship Museum

The development of maritime technology plays a big role in Danish history and especially the history of our Scandinavian ancestors, the Vikings. Viking ships and the incredible construction of them are an essential part of the Viking age. Because of these ships, the Scandinavian countries were founded, as the Vikings sailed along the shores of Europe. At the Viking Ship Museum, you'll have the opportunity to explore the ships and craftmanship of the Viking Age, as the museum is built around five original Viking Ships.

M/S Maritime Museum of Denmark

Speaking of ships and technological development. In another part of Zealand, in Helsingør, you'll find M/S Maritime Museum of Denmark. This museum is dedicated to maritime history and through its exhibitions, you'll learn about ships, technology and the people of the sea and their stories. Even the museum itself is a technological wonder, created by the world-famous architect firm BIG and representing a breathtaking example of architecture and engineering.

Mysteries, monarchs, never-ending gardens and a giant cat

There are countless children and family friendly museums in and around Copenhagen that challenge the imagination and the way in which we understand history, art and the world around us.

A thorough exploration of the past

A good place to start is the National Museum of Denmark's Ny Vestergade site (in the heart of Copenhagen). It houses a rich collection of objects and temporary exhibitions as well as a magical interactive children's section. It is hands-on, authentic and really good fun! Exploring history can be hard work and there's a dining area right next door to the children's section, where families can take a break and enjoy their brought along snacks or lunch. Visit the new exhibition "The hunt for Denmark's past" which showcases the finds of regular Danish citizens from all over the country. The exhibition portrays some of the people who have discovered treasures from the past and all the extraordinary objects that are now a part of the National Museum's collection. Be on the lookout for The Boredom Button when exploring the building. Anything can happen when you push the button, allowing the museum to truly come to life.

A giant cat and searching for wisdom

The Kastrupgaard Collection usually hosts 3-4 special exhibitions a year, focusing on 20th century visual art, and boasts an extensive graphic collection, comprising works by Danish and international artists. However, from February to September 2024 the whole museum will be occupied by the exhibition KOLOSSAL, with largescale graphic pieces by among others, Olafur Eliasson, Per Kirkeby, Adele Rannes, Tacita Dean, Adam Jeppesen, Femja Haack, Viktoria Wendel Skousen, Asger Jorn and Matt Saunders. With the younger visitors in mind, there are drop-in creative workshops for children on the first Saturday of the month (except when exhibitions are being installed), from noon to 3 pm.

Make sure you visit Camilla Thorup's 'Amagerkatten' (Amager cat) and her other sculptures in the museum's garden. And yes, you are allowed to climb on the giant cat! Visit the website for information about concerts and special events.

The Black Diamond, with its breath-taking architecture and waterfront location is a must-see when visiting Copenhagen. Its multi-stories and expansive layout make it an intriguing space for children, with space and freedom to wander and explore. Take part in The Great Diamond Hunt and go searching for The Diamond of Wisdom. Pick up an adventure bag at the shop on the ground floor and take part in a series of fun tasks and activities. The exhibition, The Camera and Us presents a selection of works from the Royal Danish Library's permanent collection, with human beings as the motif, and enquires about what photography does to our perception of ourselves and each other, and is perfect for the whole family.

An extra tip: Take a Copenhagen Harbour bus almost straight to the door!

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ZON

Solving mysteries and maze-like gardens

Located in the Copenhagen neighbourhood of Nørrebro, in the old Station 6 building on Fælledvej (dating back to 1884), the one of a kind Danish Police Museum offers an extensive and captivating collection, depicting the history of the Danish police force, a number of famous criminal cases and the detection methods used. The museum displays a fantastic collection of mug shots, police uniforms and motorcycles. Plus, a reconstruction of a prison cell and an investigation room, depicting how criminal investigators and technicians work with clues and evidence (including DNA profiling, fingerprint analysis and ballistics). There's also a children's police station, where you can solve the dog thief mystery. Please visit the website for information about special activities for children.

Frederiksborg Castle is located in Hillerød, with the most stunning surroundings and bursting with royal history. It was built as a residence for King Christian IV in the early 17th century and has one of the most pristine Baroque style gardens you will ever see. Frederiksborg Castle offers special activities for children, which vary according to the time of the year. However, the museum's 'Picture Trail' runs is a permanent feature and gives children the opportunity to learn more about historical portraits and paintings. On completion of the 'Picture Trail', show the finished mission to a member of staff and you'll be given a little reward.

There is also a lot to see in the two contrasting gardens – the Baroque garden and the landscape garden – firm favourites being the royal monograms and the water attractions. They are in service from 1 May until the end of the Autumn holiday, from 10 am to 9 pm, with a 15-minute break when the clock strikes the hour.

Explore and experience ARKEN

Monumental world art and critical impact at ARKEN Museum of Contemporary Art

In 2024, visitors can look forward to exploring the work of British-Indian Anish Kapoor – one of the world's leading contemporary artists – at ARKEN Museum for Contemporary Art, just south of Copenhagen. Featuring monumental sculptures and installations, this major solo show is Anish Kapoor's first in Scandinavia. The very latest from the Danish contemporary art scene and large-scale works by Ursula Reuter Christiansen are also some of the treats in store for art lovers. Also, the prominent French-Swiss artist and climate critic Julian Charrière will present his first-ever solo exhibition in Denmark.

GROUP THERAPY – New contemporary art 29.02.24 – 28.07.24

A large flock of inflatable balloon chickens with the fifty most popular girl's names in Denmark right now underfoot, red stilettos incorporating the devil's trident and an outboard motor as the national symbol of Greenland: these are just a few of the works featured in the exhibition, where the artists investigate our current times with incisive wit, contemplative introspection, tender care, assertive actions and wry humour, inviting audiences to reflect on humanity's place in the world. The works featured were all recently added to the museum's permanent collection, which consists of contemporary art from 1990 onwards.



ANISH KAPOOR - UNSEEN 11.04.24 - 20.10.24

The exhibition UNSEEN features British-Indian Anish Kapoor's most significant and largest works from the artist's more than forty year career and is his first major show in Scandinavia. The sculptures and installations will take over most of ARKEN's extensive exhibition rooms. The majority of the works are built and constructed to specifically interact with the museum's striking architecture, thereby changing the audience's experience of ARKEN itself, introducing new challenges and paving the way for new ways of viewing and experiencing the art.

URSULA REUTER CHRISTIANSEN 22.08.24 - 01.12.24

Ursula Reuter Christiansen has more than sixty years as an active artist under her belt, and the exhibition URSULA REUTER CHRISTIANSEN will present largescale artworks from recent years as well as entirely new works made especially for the exhibition at ARKEN. In Ursula Reuter Christiansen's works, beauty wrestles with the demonic, light with darkness. Her art is powerful, poetic and poignant.

JULIAN CHARRIÈRE 28.11.24 - 20.04.25

French-Swiss artist Julian Charrière takes a highly topical approach with his climate-aware, critical and conceptually astute works. In immersive installations and using a wide range of artistic media such as photography, performance, sculpture and video, he invites critical reflection on humanity's use of nature's resources and our impact on the environment and ecosystems. The exhibition is the second in the NATURE FUTURE trilogy, which focuses on the relationship between humankind, nature and technology.

Women in Art and Culture

In Denmark, like in the rest of the world, women have been written out of history. Neither cultural history, art history or literary history, is an exception to this – and the list goes on. Fortunately, times are changing. Now we get to travel back in time and into the future, as museums all over Copenhagen are taking part in rewriting women into history – a focus that has sparked a wide range of incredible exhibitions that you can enjoy and learn from when visiting Copenhagen.

THE WORKERS MUSEUM

In central Copenhagen, you will find The Workers Museum. With the exhibition Women's Lives, they cast a strong light on the invisible labour of women, rounding up women's working history from the last 150 years – covering frontrunners battling for equality and women's everyday lives both then and now. Delve into the life of pioneers like Nina Bang, the first female minister in a parliamentary government both in Denmark and worldwide, or Marie Christensen, founder of the Copenhagen Maid's Association, which laid the foundation for one the strongest worker's unions in Denmark today. The exhibition also offers a chance to step into the shoes of women of the past, presenting everyday life's ups and downs.

KAREN BLIXEN MUSEUM

In 1934, the book "Seven Gothic Tales" was published in the USA under the male pseudonym Isak Dinesen. A pseudonym was chosen to prevent discrimination based on both age and gender, since the true author of the book was the then 50 year old Danish woman Karen Blixen. The publication launched what evolved into one of the greatest writing careers in Danish history. Jump on the train and travel north along the Danish coast to visit Rungstedlund - The birthplace of Karen Blixen and the place where she spent many years of her life and her last days. Walk through her home and experience the exhibition Courage Humour Love which gives a unique insight not only into her breathtaking authorship, but also the extraordinary life she lived, both in Denmark and for more than 15 years on a coffee plantation in Kenya. With her oneof-a-kind personality and writing skills Blixen has a unique status in Danish cultural history.

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THE HIRSCHSPRUNG COLLECTION

Situated in the beautiful historical park Østre Anlæg, you will find The Hirschsprung Collection. Since 1911 it has been possible to experience some of the greatest Danish art from the 19th century and early 20th century in the halls of the museum. From the Danish Golden Age to the Skagen Painters, the museum had only a single flaw: it was all painted by men. Despite there being plenty of acknowledged female painters in the 19th century, they were somehow forgotten in art history. So in 2017, to right their wrongs, The Hirschsprung Collection initiated a widespread search for artworks by female painters from the 19th century and went on to expand their collection with numerous pieces of art. This has made The Hirschsprung Collection one of the best places to go if you want to experience both the greatest Danish female and male painters of the 19th century.

SMK: THE NATIONAL GALLERY OF DENMARK

Female painters of the 19th century are rightfully gaining the recognition they deserve, and The Hirschsprung Collection are not the only ones to partake in this. Right around the corner, also located in Østre Anlæg, you'll find the National Gallery of Denmark. With the grand exhibition Against All Odds - Historical Women and New Algorithms, women in Nordic art from 1870-1910 are placed at the centre of an ambitious curatorial project. With an aim to rewrite these women into art history, the exhibition explores how modern technology and the digital world can come into play. Interested in the meeting between the museum archive and the decentralized and fragmented structure of the Internet, the exhibition seeks to make visible the fact that there are numerous truths across time that we are all co-responsible for, and intertwined with. Go visit SMK and maybe you can take part in both rewriting and writing art history through the way in which you use the digital world? The exhibition runs from the 31 August to 8 December 2024.

THE PALM HOUSE IN THE BOTANICAL GARDEN (NATIONAL HISTORY MUSEUM OF DENMARK)

From great female artists of the 19th century to great female artists of today. Connecting art, architecture and nature, contemporary artist Marie Lund has created the site-specific installation Bldngs in the Botanical Garden's Palm House. Five double curved copper sculptures hang from the columns of the Palm House, adding depth and new meaning to the surrounding palm leaves and architecture. The installation is expanded upon with author Laura McLean-Ferris' text How to survive in a bell jar, drawing parallels between the copper sculptures and questions of history and nature. As you may have noticed the title of McLean-Ferris' text nods to another great author: Sylvia Plath. Thus, not just two, but three women are connected in an artistic project that simultaneously battles and criticizes history's cruelty and highlights its beauty. You can experience Bldngs until 3 November 2024.

BAKKEHUSET

Step into Bakkehuset – a Golden Age home. Close your eyes for a minute and let yourself be taken back to the Danish Golden Age. Right in front of you, you will see the enchanting and legendary Kamma Rahbek, lady of Bakkehuset, and the centre of the lively cultural life of Copenhagen. From their marriage in 1798 and onwards, Kamma lived with her husband Knud Lyhne Rahbek in Bakkehuset and together they hosted some of the greatest literary, artistic, and political minds of their time. Apart from being an impeccable hostess, she had a passion for flowers and gardening and if you step outside you can take a stroll through Kamma Rahbek's romantic garden and let the floral smells of the Golden Ages overwhelm you.

Exhibitions at DAC:

So Danish! The exhibition unfolds the history of Danish architecture from the Viking Age to the present day, and lets you travel into the architecture and understand how vital it is to the Danish democratic society.

Aware: In the spring, you can experience architecture in immersive installations that challenge you to consider the relationship between spatial atmospheres and human emotions.


Day one

09.00 – Breakfast at Københavns Bageri

Start the day with breakfast in one of the newly modernized areas of Copenhagen, The Carlsberg City District - an area that used to house the largest brewery in Danish history and now a melting pot of hip and modern eateries on the Copenhagen Food Scene. Drink a cup of coffee and eat some dreamy, modern Danish pastry at the popular Københavns Bageri, before heading to Frederiksberg.

🛑 10.30 – Cisternerne

Located in the centre of Frederiksberg, is Søndermarken. A large park where you can expect to meet locals walking their dogs, joggers and children playing. Right at the end of Søndermarken you will see Copenhagen Zoo and its characteristic tower. Our first stop on the cultural trip to Frederiksberg is just across from the Zoo. Cisternerne is an old water reservoir beneath the ground and today, a subterranean art space. At Cisternerne, you will experience contemporary art where your mobile won't be able to find a signal. In other words, you can immerse yourself completely in the exhibitions, with nothing to disturb you.

12.00 – Lunch at Promenaden

In the middle of Frederiksberg, right on Frederiksberg Allé is Promenaden. A nostalgic pearl from the 1930s where you can drink a beer and eat a traditional Danish lunch. Promenaden is a brasserie-styled restaurant, with plenty of seats outside – also a great location for people-spotting, if the sun is out. Promenaden is a perfect place for a lunch break between cultural experiences and a good opportunity to taste some good, old Danish Smørrebrød.

🛑 14.00 – Møstings

From Cisternerne in Søndermarken, you can walk through another green area, namely Frederiksberg Garden. A garden originally created for Frederiksberg Castle, but now a romantic, public park. On the outskirts of Frederiksberg Garden you will find Møstings, a 19th century villa turned into a contemporary exhibition place. Here professional artists are invited to make proposals for site-specific exhibition projects for the exhibition rooms on the first floor. Entrance is always free for everyone.

16.00 – STORM

As a last stop on the cultural Frederiksberg tour, we recommend that you visit STORM – a museum about Danish humour and satire. At STORM, you can dive into the history of danish humour and satire, presenting both historical and contemporary perspectives. Until October 2024 you can also learn about satire in relation to censorship with examples from Danish history in the exhibition "The Censored Exhibition on Censorship".

18.30 – Dinner at Bouillon

To finish day one, we recommend that you eat your dinner at the recently opened Restaurant Bouillon – highly inspired by the restaurants with the same name in France. Bouillon is a large-scale bistro, with delicious bistro food for every budget. Both suitable for couples, families and solo travellers – but book a table in advance or you can expect to wait in a line for a while. A Parisian way to end the day in Frederiksberg – the Paris of Copenhagen!

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Day two

09.00 – Breakfast at Apotek 57

Day two begins with breakfast at Apotek 57 in the historic centre of Copenhagen – you won't miss their cylinder-shaped signature croissant! Apotek 57 is a café combined with a showroom created by Frama, a Danish contemporary design studio. Heavenly croissants and Danish design at the same time – a perfect way to start the day!

Kl. 11.00 – Rosenborg Castle

First stop is Rosenborg Castle, located in the middle of The Kings Garden. The 400 year old renaissance castle was built by one of the most famous kings in the history of Denmark, Christian IV. This former king's castle now hosts a museum dedicated to royal history and treasures from the Danish kings and queens. It's also at Rosenborg Castle that you'll get the chance to see the Crown Jewels of the Danish Monarchy.

URS

13.00 – Ny Carlsberg Glyptotek and Café Picnic

From one building with old treasures to another! The next stop on day two is Ny Carlsberg Glyptotek. A museum founded by the brewer and art collector, Carl Jacobsen in the 19th century. The museum contains a unique blend of art and antiquities – and new, modern takes on how to create exhibitions. End your visit to Ny Carlsberg Glyptotek with a lunch in the Museums café, Picnic, overlooking the breathtaking Winter Garden.

15.00 – Copenhagen Contemporary

Hop on your bike or take bus 2A to completely other surroundings. Leaving the historic centre of Copenhagen, towards Refshaleøen a modern and former industrial area by the Copenhagen Harbour. Here you will find fancy bakeries, natural wine bars and... Copenhagen Contemporary! A large exhibition venue for contemporary art. Whether you are a solo traveller or a big family, Copenhagen Contemporary is an inspiring place to spend the afternoon as they excel in creating lively and relevant exhibitions for everyone.

18.00 – Dinner at Goldfinch

You can stay at Refshaleøen and enjoy a casual dinner in the sunset, at the "Reffen" Street Food market during the summer season. Otherwise, we suggest that you hop on the harbour bus back to the city. Right at Kongens Nytorv, back in the historical centre of the city, you should eat your dinner at Goldfinch. High-quality, Cantonese food in festive surroundings and the most delicious scallop-sesame toast you'll ever taste.

Danish Architecture Center is a good place to start for a thorough and immersive Danish architecture and design experience. The permanent exhibition So Danish! relates the history of Danish architecture from Viking times to the present day. The exhibition highlights the vital role that architecture has always played in society and the various style periods, methods and attitudes that contribute to the built environment in Denmark. Temporary exhibitions in 2024 include Aware - Architecture and Senses, with spatial installations by architecture firm 3XN GXN, which deal with how architecture affects us deep down in ourselves. Please check the website for more information. And, don't forget to try the 4-storey, 40-metre-long spiral slide and the DAC Café, which serves really good coffee and delicious locally sourced Nordic dishes. If the weather permits, the view from the rooftop terrace is spectacular.

Designmuseum Danmark has recently undergone an extensive makeover and strives to present Danish design in a comprehensive and appealing way. The permanent collection is stunning in itself, but don't miss the temporary exhibitions around the museum. 2024 offers an exciting mix. The iconic supermarket IRMA is highlighted in IRMA – A DESIGN HISTORY, depicting how art and design can be integrated into everyday life. In Love and War, Japanese woodblock prints from the museum's permanent collection depict heroic warriors in battle and beautiful young people. Danish Modern unfolds Danish design's story from the 1920s to 1970s, and shares the design process behind many of the Danish classics. The Future is Present addresses how design will be approached in the future and how designers are already trying to solve global challenges with common sense, inclusion and curiosity.

ARKEN opened in 1996 and is housed in a striking and monumental building by Søren Robert Lund. Opening an art museum in Ishøj was the part of a greater and lengthy plan to turn "Vestegnen" into a significant cultural area. And, this plan has definitely worked, not only because of the beautiful piece of architecture that forms its physical base, or the permanent collection or a constant stream of world-class temporary exhibitions, but also because of the location, the nearby sea and the sparse landscape around it. This year, ARKEN presents (among other exhibitions) Anish Kapoor's first major solo exhibition in Scandinavia. With large-scale works and installations created over a span of 40 years, Unseen investigates Kapoor's common theme of sight and perception and what we can and cannot see with the naked eye. Surely a feast for all the senses in this unique space.

A celebration of windows and beyond

It's not every day we think about how important windows are. Established in 2006, the Villum Window Collection reminds us of how significant the window is for our quality of life – allowing us to look out into the world, breath and be exposed to light. The collection comprises approximately 300 historical windows, from the 17th century to the present day and intricately tells the story of the window from a technical, artisanal and historical perspective. Explore the journey from the first apertures in roofs and facades to modern, climate-friendly windows. There is also a timeline detailing the evolution of the window and visitors will be surprised by the breadth of this field.

Vor Frue Kirke (Church of Our Lady), is probably best known for King Frederik and Queen Mary's wedding 20 years ago, but it is much more than that. It is a monumental building, which is effortlessly integrated into the city centre from the outside, but once you step inside you are instantly met with a tranquillity amid the grandeur. The Copenhagen Cathedral Museum is tucked behind the alter on the first floor, in a beautiful light room with big windows and a circular wall. The museum shop has a great selection of books about artists featured in their exhibitions, the church, church art, figurines, souvenirs and postcards. You can also visit the basement and view the exposed remains of the Gothic church, dating back to 1316 and experience the original street level. The current church building was designed by architect Christian Frederik Hansen and decorated by world-renowned sculptor Bertel Thorvaldsen.

Ordrupgaard, in Charlottenlund is a definite favourite, not only for its dissemination of Danish an international art, its open-air artworks, and Zaha Hadid's

architecture, but also for how it all flows together, providing an ideal cultural experience. The Finn Juhl House adds to Ordrupgaard's repertoire, with a unique opportunity to explore his work as an architect and furniture designer. Especially as very few houses designed by Finn Juhl exist today. The house not only showcases his architecture and iconic furniture, including the Poet Sofa and the Silver Table, but also prominent Danish artists of the time, Vilhelm Lundstrøm, Asger Jorn, Erik Thommesen and Sonja Ferlov Mancoba. All of this comes together in a harmonious whole. Open on Saturdays and Sundays, from 11 am to 5 pm.

A walk through history

While you're chasing your daily amount of steps and fresh air, you might as well acquire some historical knowledge about Copenhagen and its cultural landscape. This is our walk through history!

Museum of Copenhagen

With over 400 objects, the Museum of Copenhagen's permanent exhibition walks you through 1,400 years of Copenhagen history. The tour offers a rich variety of stories about Copenhagen and Copenhageners through the ages: Discover the first known trace of human activity in the Greater Copenhagen area, hear about the skeleton of a medieval warrior, or stories of the great epidemics and fires that have shaped the Copenhagen we know today.

Thorvaldsen's Museum

Walking 560 steps straight ahead, you will at some point see a building of vivid colours and grand architectural design. This characteristic museum located on Slotsholmen, was the first museum in Denmark when it opened in 1848 – and looks almost the same as it did when it opened over 150 years ago. The museum displays the work of the world-famous Danish sculptor Bertel Thorvaldsen, who donated his large collection of work to the city of Copenhagen, including his collection of paintings by contemporary European artists.

The Amalienborg Museum

Moving on, approximately 2,240 steps through the inner city, you will most likely start noticing some funky-looking hats. Through snowstorms and heatwaves, the Royal Lifeguards stand in front of Amalienborg, the official residence for the Danish royal family, one of the world's oldest monarchies. This palace is a must-see for anyone with an interest in royal history. A visit to Amalienborg Museum gives you access to a behind-the-scenes journey through 150 years of royal life.

Kunsthal Charlottenborg

Around 1049 steps from Amalienborg, you will find another royal pearl. The construction of the Charlottenborg Palace began in 1672, as the Dutch baroque residence for the Norwegian governor Ulrik Frederik Gyldenløve, the illegitimate son of the Danish King Frederik III. At the turn of the century, Queen Charlotte Amalie bought the castle, and her name has remained with it since. As time went by The Royal Danish Art Academy took over most of the building and since 1883 Kunsthal Charlottenborg has been a prominent centre for contemporary exhibitions. The museum displays an ambitious programme with international new talents, as well as established stars from both Denmark and abroad.

North Atlantic House

Just a stone's throw away from Kunsthal Charlottenborg, you will find an old maritime warehouse. Once a centre for trade to and from the Faroe Islands, Finnmark, Iceland and Greenland, the building was used to store products such as dry fish, salted herring, whale oil and skins before being sold off to European markets. However, when entering, you will find that the historic warehouse now is a thriving cultural centre, dedicated to the art and culture of Denmark's former North Atlantic colonies.

Church of our Saviour

Crossing the bridge, and walking by Christianshavns Kanal, you will probably sooner or later spot a twirling tower on the horizon. It should take you about 1,760 steps to identify the large baroque church connected to it. Our Saviour's is one of Denmark's most famous churches, with more than 200,000 people climbing the stairway to the top every year to touch the gilded globe. If you are courageous enough to embark on the 400 steps, the view from the tower of Our Saviour's is the best in town!

Copenhageners recommend

I think Holmen definitely is a place worth visiting. I suggest that you take a walk from Holmen out to the incredible Refshaleøen. At Refshaleøen you should visit Copenhagen Contemporary – a large exhibition venue for contemporary art. When you have been there and experienced an exhibition or two, instead of walking back to the city, you can go down to the water and take the harbour bus back to central Copenhagen.

When in Copenhagen, I recommend that you go for a walk on Jægersborggade in Nørrebro. In Jægersborggade you will find a lot of unique shops, beautiful handicrafts and experience a really lovely atmosphere. In addition, there are often some cool and exciting events that you can take part in. It is also an excellent place to find a gift or maybe a unique souvenir from some of the artisan's shops located on the street.

A couple of minutes' walk from Stengade is Blågårdsgade, a colourful street where you can eat some delicious food, drink a beer at Escobar and also browse some interesting art shops.

In celebration of the local community

Heerup Museum is situated in the community centre Rødovregaard in Rødovre and takes about 40 minutes by train or bus from Copenhagen Central Station. The museum (established in 2001) is dedicated to the life and work of Henry Heerup (internationally acclaimed, Danish painter and graphic artist, 1907-1993). Heerup was a truly versatile artist and the museum really captures his passion and ability to investigate materials, motifs and themes. The architect Bernd Kjelland paid particular attention to the light and this helps create the perfect setting, with light coming in through stateof-the-art skylights. Visit the website for upcoming exhibitions and other events including lectures, workshop and concerts.

The Museums of Furesø in Farum and Værløse are made up of five museums, which present a fascinating mix of local and modern international history and the intersection of the two. They are: The Immigrant Museum in Farum, Mosegaarden in Værløse, Købmandsbutik Cornelen (The grocery shop Cornelen), Flyvestationen i Værløse (the airbase in Værløse) and the Stads- og lokalarktivet (the municipal and local archives in Farum). There is a clear dedication to exploring history, involving the local community and visitors in general, and sharing this heritage in a broader perspective. The museums research and shed light on Furesø municipality's past and its journey to becoming a Copenhagen suburb, with a special focus on the relationship between the rural and the urban, newcomers, natives and minorities. Everyday moments and moorland wonderment

The Nivaagaard Collection is located in Nivå, 50 minutes (by train and on foot) from Copenhagen Central Station. The museum features an impressive collection of Danish Golden Age art, Italian Renaissance and Dutch Baroque paintings and presents a diverse and exciting range of special exhibitions. This year includes The joy of everyday life - in the Netherlands and Denmark, featuring everyday moments in famous masterpieces. Next, an exhibition focusing on the cow and its place in Danish art and cultural history, with a mix of contemporary art and pieces from the permanent collection. In September, two Rembrandt portraits will be reunited after being apart for 223 years, in the exhibition Rembrandt Reunited. Finally, visitors can look forward to new works by Michael Kvium, in FLAT LAND, which opens in the autumn.

Rudolph Tegner's Museum and Statue Park is located in a protected moor area south of Dronningmølle and is dedicated to the sculptor Rudolph Tegner, showcasing 335 of his works. The concrete building from 1937/8 was designed by the artist himself and compliments the stark moorland landscape. Tegner's aim was to create a kind of treasure chest, which is why the entrance is small in comparison to the building itself. This accentuates the feeling of wonderment when visitors enter the huge, light space. This year, visitors can look forward to a special exhibition of graphic artworks by Morten Schelde, Kevin Francis Grey's Momentary Monumentality where his works are presented among Tegner's permanent collection and an audio work in the Statue Park by Ditte Rønn.

Tranquil waterside museums

Louisiana Museum of Modern Art is located in Humlebæk, 45 minutes (by train and on foot) from Copenhagen Central Station. Louisiana is a firm favourite with Danes and tourists and is a very important piece of Danish modernist architecture that fits perfectly into the surrounding landscape, tucked in between the forest and the Sound (Øresund). The museum has grown considerably since opening in 1958, with seven extensions in total and all carried out by the architects Bo and Wohlert, and by the architect Claus Wohlert, with the East Wing and beyond. The wonderful children's wing provides inspiration for not only children, but their parents too and the Sculpture Park invites visitors on an endless adventure, filled with magic and wonder, in the undulating grounds and forest. There is a soothing calm about this museum, and it's easy to spend a whole day in this beautiful place.

Munkeruphus in Dronningmølle is also located by the Sound (Øresund), on beautiful landscaped grounds. The museum was once a country house designed for civil engineer Frederik Raaschou and his family by architects Terkel Hjejle and Niels Rosenkjær, and is a rare example of American Art and Crafts in Danish architecture. Today it comprises an exhibition space focusing on contemporary art, a gift shop and café. In recent years, Munkeruphus has begun to focus on the relationship between art, nature and learning and the museum offers a range of events, often in collaboration with other cultural and nature/conservation institutions. Hybrid artist Gunnar Aagaard Andersen also lived in the house (1958-1982) and the museum has a dedicated a room to the dissemination of his diverse and innovative practice.

Nip over to Sweden and visit Malmö Konsthall, it only takes about 45 minutes on the train. Established in 1975, this extraordinary art museum testifies to art being accessible to everyone and is truly an inspirational and immersive experience. And, it's free of charge. There are three to four exhibitions a year, featuring local and international artists, reflecting the world we live in today. 2024 welcomes exhibitions by Koo Jeong A in the summer and Lenke Rothman in the autumn. The bookshop is really worth a visit and offers a comprehensive selection of books, journals, magazines, posters and postcards. The popular restaurant Smak is located in the same building as Malmö Konsthall and offers affordable meals and drinks.





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Inaugurated in 1752, the tower's 400 steps offer a climb cherished by visitors and locals. Embark on a remarkable journey as you ascend the final 150 steps that spiral externally around the spire, leading you to a breathtaking 360-degree panorama of Copenhagen's skyline. The architect Lauritz de Thurah (1706-1759) designed the spire, his greatest work. He was inspired by the university chapel of Sant'Jvo alla Sapienza in Rome where Borromini's baroque tower also has an external spiral form. While Borromini built in sandstone, de Thurah used oak, making it possible to achieve the great height of the spire. At the top, Christ stands with the golden orb and banner of



victory. The six formidable church bells and the exquisite carillon hold deep significance for the community of Christianshavn. Its delicate melodies can be heard daily throughout the neighbourhood.

In the castle, you can also see a vast and unique collection illustrating the history of the Danish monarchy from the early 16th century to the mid 18th century. The museum offers humorous and entertaining stories from a much-loved cultural heritage. From artists of the past like Storm P., Liva Weel and Dirch Passer to present day artists like Roald Als. Casper Christensen and Lisbet Dahl. Humorous and satirical art gives not only an entertaining perspective on Denmark's history from the Constitution Act of 1849 to today, but also a picture of humour and satire as a core



element in the Danish national character. On the first floor, you can experience the artistic universe of the Danish painter, cartoonist and humourist Storm P. (1882-1949). Until 20 October, you can also enjoy the exhibition "The Censored Exhibition On Censorship". It showcases works that have come into existence solely because there have been - and still are actors trying to silence satirists. It provides a rare insight into how satirists have viewed censorship as a creative challenge rather than a straitjacket since the beginning of the 19th century.
